The Purchase of Watts Bridge Memorial Airfield

E CAN VO IT:

The origins of Watts Bridge Memorial Airfield (WBMA) date back to WW2. During this period the Department of Civil Aviation explored the idea of having an airfield as an enroute emergency airstrip, which could also be used as part of the Empire Air Training Scheme for pilots learning the art of air navigation. In June 1942 the Army Cooperation Squadron started pressing for an airfield near Toogoolawah. The current location of the airfield was deemed the most suitable site and construction of 'Toogoolawah' airfield commenced without delay. Operations were in full swing early in 1943, with No. 5 Squadron operating DH82 (Tiger Moth) and Wirraway aircraft.

After the war the airfield fell into disuse, with all the original

wartime buildings removed. The land was used mainly for grazing cattle. During the 80's an enthusiastic group of recreational pilots rediscovered the airfield and decided to re-establish the airfield to be known as 'Watts Bridge Memorial Airfield' a fitting name reflecting its location and past history. The airfield land was owned by the Queensland government under an authority which today is known as Seqwater. In 1994 a 30 + 30 year subsub lease was granted to the airfield occupants, with the condition that the airfield be used solely for recreational flying purposes. Through the hard work and persistence of the many volunteers

past and present the members of Watts Bridge now have a facility that they can truly be proud of.

The past couple of decades have seen the demise of general aviation, which in part has been the result of the sale of government airport leases, pressure on airfield land for residential or commercial development, and some councils that have imposed unrealistic leases and charges on aircraft owners and operators. Fortunately, Watts Bridge has been somewhat shielded from these pressures mainly because of the airfield's remote location, cooperative council, and because of the long term lease that had been originally established. The one thing, however that members had longed for was to own the airfield. Why? Because it would ensure that this important piece of aviation history would live on as an active airfield, because members, through airfield council's and Board of Management representation, would have a say in how the airfield would be developed into the future, and finally those who had invested into the airfield's buildings and infrastructure would have the security of ownership.

Unexpectedly, this year Seqwater contacted the Watts Bridge Board of Management seeking interest in the purchase of the airfield land. Without delay the Board met with representatives from Seqwater, who were pleased that the Board was interested in the concept of WBMA Inc. purchasing the airfield. A considerable amount of work followed this meeting and important decisions had to be made. It was clear that Seqwater wanted the airfield to be sold to WBMA Inc. and continue as an airfield, however should that not occur the airfield would go onto the open market. The Board in consultation with the airfield's legal team decided on a strategy to move forward that would include equal ownership of the airfield by all members. This was the fairest structure and it was the simplest, as WBMA

Inc. would become the owner of the Head Lease and airfield management would continue as normal.

This plan was put to the WBMA membership at a General Meeting on the 22 August 2015. Overwhelmingly members at the meeting voted in favour of the Board of Management's plan to purchase the airfield. Approximately 35% of the funding would come from WBMA's current savings and the rest would be through loans and donations from the membership. Prior to the General Meeting a large number of leaseholders and members had

expressed an interest in loaning or donating money, however it was at this meeting that everybody was asked to contribute to the purchase of the airfield.

At the time of writing this article, the Board of Management had received 40% of the sum required. Perhaps surprisingly, this money has come from just over a quarter of WBMA's membership and two of the airfield's clubs. The airfield will require further funding, so if you are holding back, now is the time to either enter into a loan agreement or make a donation. By all members making a contribution either small or large, it does help reduce the financial burden on other Watts Bridge community members.

In closing, a big thank you to all those people and organisations that have got behind this project, your efforts will not go unrecognised. The airfield has a great future and this purchase will set an example across the country of how a dedicated group of aviators can make a difference.


Gathering of Eagles Australia

AEROBATICS OVER WATTS

Watts is home base for the QLD Chapter of the Australian Aerobatic Club - we have our club house and we also have an aerobatic performance area - some refer to it as the aerobatic box marked out on the ground by 9 yellow painted "box markers" arranged in a square 1000 m long and 1000m wide. The area is located adjacent and to the south and west of the threshold for 30.

The club holds monthly practice weekends and mini comps through the year and the State titles are held around July These dates can be accessed on the club website.

Queensland Chapte The club holds a formal approval from CASA which entitles us to operate a separate aerobatic box frequency - the procedure is that after leaving the CTAF aerobatic pilots then switch to this frequency for feedback and comments from observers on the ground while they are practising or competing in the aerobatic area - whenever this is happening the club operate two radios on the ground - one radio remains on CTAF to communicate with transiting and circuit traffic to avoid conflicts and the other on the aerobatic box frequency. Pilots will switch back to the CTAF frequency after they have finished in the aerobatic box and before entering the CTAF.



Aerobatic pilots complete in different categories from the highest grade UNLIMITED through to GRADUATE. Pilots operating in the lower grades will usually be operating down to 1500 ft AGL. Pilots in the higher grades down to a few hundred metres above the ground. So the possibility exists for conflicts with circuit traffic.

"CAUTION: AEROBATICS CAN BE ADDICTIVE"

If you are operating at Watts when the aerobatic area is active - and both frequencies are in use - you may expect a call on taxi or calling inbound from "Watts Advisory" to let you know the area is active. This in an advisory service only. We certainly appreciate the courtesy and cooperation we receive from pilots to manage aerobatics safely around other traffic.

The object of the radio calls is safety and maintaining separation. If you have a difficulty or emergency the usual rules and procedures apply - make any necessary broadcasts as required

The same circuit procedural rules apply to all aerobatic aircraft operating at Watts as to all other traffic. Safety for our members, pilots and all other users on the aerodrome is paramount to us. Minimising noise impacts on residents and flying neighbourly is also treated as critical. From time to time we receive feedback or comments from others -- that feedback is always welcome and where the committee considers it appropriate and necessary corrective action or changes will be made.

New members are, of course, always welcome.
